## Director's Note:

### We've come a long way (baby)...

Ten years ago, a small group from St. Matthew Lutheran Church and Faith in Place set the dream of a community farm in motion, converting four acres of corn to diverse vegetables, breaking ground to install a greenhouse and recruiting our first CSA members. Nearly 20% of the first year's harvest was donated to the Eastern Illinois Foodbank, most of our CSA members signed up for a second year and a whole lot of people shared in the labor and joy of launching Sola Gratia Farm. Ten years later, we're farming 15 acres, employing between 15-20 people per year, provide for over 200 CSA members and their families weekly, sell at three farmers markets, co-lead a community gardening program and a district-wide Farm to School program and now donate weekly to not only the Eastern Illinois Foodbank, but also two soup kitchens and two free markets, still hitting that mark of at least 20% and as much as 30% of our harvest donated. Over 110,000 pounds to date.

### ...but still have work to do.


And so, we have been working to both expand and transition our operation. Currently, we lease 11 of our 15 acres, not a sustainable position for how we want to serve our community. We are planning to purchase a new acreage in order to secure long-term financial sustainability, support our long-term ecological sustainability, and continue to alleviate hunger in our community while expanding our offerings as a community farm to include perennial crops including fruits. Development of a new and expanded acreage will focus our production, opening up the original four acres and infrastructure on the St. Matthew Lutheran Church campus to be used for targeted demonstration, outreach and education activities and events. We have a unique opportunity to showcase and demonstrate our regenerative growing techniques that can be implemented in gardens and other farms as well as increase community engagement.

I've been thinking a lot lately about the people that have made Sola Gratia Farm what it is today and poised to become in the future. The brave and committed congregants of St. Matt's, pioneering and ingenuous farm managers, the staff members who have worked SO HARD to grow food better and smarter, our supportive and loving volunteers that have helped us have fun while we work and the hundreds of people that have chosen us as their farmers, nourishing themselves and their families with the food we have been so proud to grow while making sharing with those less fortunate, possible.




Produce Distribution, 2021

## Mission Impact:

In 2021, we:

- Connected over 200 families to fresh, healthy, seasonal food through 4-20 week CSA shares, and to other local producers



- Donated vegetables weekly to Eastern Illinois Foodbank (serving patrons in 17 counties), Daily Bread Soup Kitchen (serving 200 meals per day), Jubilee Café (serving ~100 meals every Monday evening), Channing Murray Foundation(CMF)/Red Herring Restaurant (preparing/delivering meals and staple goods to Bucket Brigade clients) and other local food programs

- Donated and distributed over 4,200 pounds of produce, gardening supplies and staple goods with C-U Public Health District(CUPHD) at our Free Friday Market, reaching more than 200 families in our neighborhood. Also developed and installed, with Cornerstone Fellowship, CUPHD, HACC YouthBuild and SUNA, a Little Free Pantry at the same location to provide staple goods throughout the week and in the winter.



- Partnered with Carle Hospital, CU City Farms, Prosperity Gardens, and CUPHD to distribute over 11,600 pounds of vegetables from the Mobile Market, co-located by Carle Mobile Health Clinics and held twice weekly to serve four low-income neighborhoods.

- Expanded sales to those served by SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), WIC (Women, Infant and Children) and Seniors Program at farmers' markets: 23% at Champaign Farmers Market and nearly 11% at Urbana Farmers Markets.

- Donated produce to UHS Student Senate Thanksgiving Meal, an annual community event to provide hot Thanksgiving meals free of charge.



- Administered Solidarity Gardens CU, a collaborative project begun in 2020 with Cunningham Township, Urbana Park District, CMF, and Urbana Free Library (UFL) to increase food production for our neighbors in need by empowering local home and community gardeners. Highlights for 2021: expanded SGCU volunteer base, over 1,000 seeds and plants distributed to home and community gardeners, expanded accessibility of the UFL Seed Exchange with a mini seed library at Meadowbrook Park, developed additional 1,000 sq.ft. of growing space, distributed over 3,000 volunteer-grown pounds of produce through 8 distribution partners, and engaged HACC YouthBuild and Urbana High School students in projects improving infrastructure at Meadowbrook and Cunningham Township gardens.

- Shared thousands of vegetable starts with local community gardens, including Randolph Street Community Garden, Lierman Community Garden, Cunningham Township garden, Habitat for Humanity garden, First Followers garden, Mother Carr's Farm, school gardens, and Solidarity Gardens.

- Completed a community wide planning process with partners from CUPHD, USD 116 and Arbor Food Service to develop a F2S program to increase student access to healthy, local food, and connect students with the resources they need to support lifelong healthy habits. Highlights from 2021 include: release of F2S Action Plan for USD116 schools; administered district-wide Farm to School events including taste tests and the Great Apple Crunch, engaging over 1000 USD116 students ; and started installation or expansion of edible food gardens at all 9 USD116 schools



- Helped launch the Local Food Policy Caucus with other local food farmers and in partnership with Illinois Stewardship Alliance (ISA) to solve problems and put forward legislative solutions to grow the local food economy and enhance food security.

- Engaged our community with monthly events, many in collaboration with partners – including Plant Sale, film viewing (with UFL), on-farm yoga (with Daily Bread Yoga), Ears n Beers (with Riggs Brewery), Urbana Amble (with local gardeners), Summer Shindig and Farmer Roundtable with Representative Davis (with ISA), and volunteer opportunities with Eastern Illinois Foodbank and Silverhearts.



- Offered 4 cooking classes on meal prep, pickling, cooking greens, and crisper clean-out meals through Facebook, reaching at least 110 people
- Welcomed many to the farm for on-site tours and workdays: students K-college, service and professional organizations, and volunteers.
